The students from the Clontarf Academy were fortunate to be visited by representatives from Rio Tinto Mining recently who provided an insight to working at Rio Tinto and how to successfully apply for their internship program. Employees explained what is involved in their role at Rio and what essential skills are required. Students were also excited to learn about the development of a three day "Rio Ready" training program currently being designed, which should be ready for implementation next semester. It is expected that the program will help to equip the Clontarf students for employment with Rio Tinto in 2018 and it will likely involve an overnight stay in a "donga" on site. The presentation by Rio Tinto Mining was very valuable and the Clontarf students very much appreciated the advice offered to them.

The Trade Training Centre students continue to work very productively this year and many of the students have secured placements for work experience; impressively, there have already been two offers of apprenticeships as a result. Our Aboriginal students are looking forward to short training courses discussed at the recent Rio Tinto Mining presentation which will prepare them for the application and interview process. A new Trade Maths program has also been initiated this year and after discussions with our industry partners, a program that links closely to the skills required by employers has been introduced. As pictured, students in the Trade Training Centre are continuing to learn valuable industry skills such as the safe use of the oxy acetylene equipment and workshop machinery. An assignment on the properties of metals allowed students to machine, harden, temper and test their own centre punches. The teaching of these and other vital industry skills means that the College Trade Training Centre continues to assist its students along the pathway to successful employment in the industries of their choice.

Healthy Initiatives



The Stay on Campus Program has continued to promote student engagement in College life during Term 2 by introducing a number of healthy events which promote the benefits of exercise. In weeks 1 and 2 of the second term our school was involved in fundraising for the RSL for Anzac Day. They also participated in the long-running Jump Rope For Heart initiative as a fun and healthy lunchtime activity with staff and students. Students sought sponsorships in order to raise research funds for the very worthy Heart Foundation. The initiative coincided with Heart Week 2017 between 30 April and 6 May and attracted a large number of students keen to show off their impressive skipping skills. Mindfulness meditation sessions were also held during week 3 in Term 2 and proved to be a very relaxing way to unwind, especially considering exams are just around the corner for our students.

The College Health Committee has also been busy in Term 2 with the launch of the 10 000 Step Challenge which many students and teachers enthusiastically participated in. The lunch time walking groups highlighted the many benefits of exercise such as improved fitness, mood and mental wellbeing, reduction in the risk of disease and increased energy levels. The number of steps walked by all participants was accurately recorded using the special phone app and specially distributed pedometers. Part of the challenge also involved teams attempting to walk the length of the Rabbit Proof Fence (1600kms) over three weeks. Students were pitted against teachers in the final calculation of steps walked in order to generate some good-hearted sportsmanship and healthy competition.

The Honourable Bill Johnston MLA, Minister for Mines and Petroleum, Commerce and Industrial Relations; Electoral Affairs, Asian Engagement and the local member for Cannington, recently met with the College Principal, Dr Kath Partridge, to discuss the plans for the Department of Education and Sevenoaks Senior College to acquire a sizable parcel of land located directly behind the College's Automotive and Metals and Engineering Trade Training Centre. This new allotment of green space to the College, a Western Australian Labor party election promise, will ensure students will have access to some much needed recreational space. Currently the campus has very little vacant land for students to kick a ball or run around or just sit under a peaceful shady tree to enjoy each other's company.

Whilst there is considerable work to be undertaken to ensure this land is re-assigned to the Department of Education and is fenced and ready for College use, the College Board, staff and students are absolutely delighted with this significant allocation which will have an enormous impact on the quality of the educational experience enjoyed by students at the College. The realisation of this election promise by the McGowan Labor government is very much appreciated by our entire school community.

A number of additional support personnel are employed at the College to assist and help students manage their busy and sometimes complex lives. Our College Youth Workers, Niamh, Louise and Michelle; our College Nurse, Vanessa and our School Psychologist, Les, along with teacher Advocates are all available to ensure students are well supported whilst they are completing their studies with us. The Try it Out Tuesday initiative that started midway through 2016 resumed at the beginning of this school year and now attracts increasingly more participants. The fortnightly gatherings involve Sevenoaks Senior College teachers voluntarily meeting over lunch to share teaching and learning strategies in lively exchange sessions built around discussion of different pedagogical approaches. The sessions are often facilitated by one of the four teachers who attended the Tactical Teaching Reading workshops held at the end of last year and which have formed the basis of several professional development days delivered by the College for all staff in 2017. The *Tactical Teaching* program is designed to equip teachers with a range of practical strategies and processes to use before, during and after reading, applicable to any subject area. The training provided at the workshops has led to a whole school approach to improved literacy.

Specific strategies are explored and explained further in the Try it Out Tuesday sessions, during which many teachers have reported marked progressions in the reading performance of students. The collegial discussions have also covered approaches to assessment and feedback, guestioning techniques and note-taking. Try it out Tuesday sessions continue to provide a popular, regular forum in which teachers are able to extend their skills, remain well-informed about current educational theories and share their professional knowledge with colleagues.
