Taylar Brunet



First Aid Focus Program



A sizable group of 70 Year 11 and 12 students recently participated in a First Aid Focus High School Course which aims to equip teenagers with the practical first aid skills required when faced with a real medical emergency. The course involved role playing activities and practice of the recovery position, as well as hands-on exercises using CPR mannequins and even defibrillator training. All the student participants left the program feeling confident that they could use these skills if ever faced with an emergency medical situation.

Hospitality Excursion

In early August the Year 12 Hospitality students visited Bentley TAFE Pines Restaurant to indulge in a delicious three course lunch. The excursion allowed students to independently select and order dishes they wished to sample and they were waited on and served by the Bentley TAFE students. This experience gave our Sevenoaks Senior College students an insight into the service and food industry as well as showcasing the specific skills that would be expected of them if they choose to further their studies at Bentley upon graduation. After lunch, students enjoyed an interesting walking tour of the TAFE campus to observe the great facilities on offer. "Try it out Tuesday"

Sevenoaks Senior College teachers are committed to ongoing professional development opportunities and they regularly participate in activities designed to enhance and improve educational outcomes for students. One such activity is "Try it out Tuesday", a fortnightly teaching and learning strategies exchange session which allows teachers to share and discuss information about different pedagogical techniques.



Deadly Dreaming



Deadly Dreaming offered an opportunity for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students to network with organisations who are offering real opportunities for study, work and training after high school. Deadly Dreaming, hosted by Murdoch University was delivered in a fun and engaging way that allowed students to interact with the various organisations and leave the event having created lasting relationships that will greatly benefit them in their future endeavours.



The "Teach Like a Champion" reference text written by Doug Lemov often provides a starting point for discussion of research-based strategies in relation to supporting learning in teachers' individual contexts and wide application to different learning areas. Teachers can trial the particular strategies highlighted at the "Try it out Tuesday" session and then reflect on their effectiveness at the next meeting, including discussion of possible modifications or adaptions that may be necessary to improve positive outcomes for students.

Strategies are primarily centred on learning and include specific literacy strategies designed to improve students' reading and writing. Teachers have also covered strategies for assessment and feedback, questioning techniques and encouraging students to "code switch' their language to more appropriate academic writing. "Try it out Tuesday" has provided a welcome opportunity for teachers to extend their skills, remain well-informed about current educational theories and share their professional knowledge with colleagues.

Library Week

Library Week runs simultaneously with the National Book Week in August and the theme for 2016 was Australia: Story Country. Sevenoaks Senior College celebrated Library Week with the a range of engaging activities including an inter-Advocacy competition testing the students' knowledge of Australian fiction authors, experiments with robotics and electronics in the Library at lunchtimes and a competition in which participants were asked to guess the number of books on offer for borrowing in the Library.

Students were also invited to offer useful feedback about how they use the current Library services, what they find most beneficial and even to offer recommendations for improvements. The top two readers in the College, based on their impressive borrowing history, were identified as Casey Cuming (Year 12) and Tyler Littler (Year 11) both of Advocacy Group 26. These students are commended on their wide reading and were rewarded with a special book buying excursion.

Harry Perkins Institute of Medical Research

On August 15 the Year 12 Human Biology students enjoyed an interesting excursion to the BioDiscovery Centre located in the Harry Perkins Institute of Medical Research which allowed them to role play as molecular scientists for the day.



On arriving at the BioDiscovery laboratory, the students were firstly required to change into lab coats and safety glasses after which time they enjoyed the opportunity to pipette, sample, load gels, use thermocyclers and other sophisticated equipment to carry out a range of biotech techniques. After learning about the process of PCR to amplify DNA, students themselves practised the learned skill by amplifying the mutated BRAF gene which causes melanoma. This sample was then used to create a DNA profile using Gel Electrophoresis.

Each student group was assigned a young research scientist to provide guidance during the experiments. This partnership provided an ideal chance for our students to ask some useful questions about life as a research scientist and potential careers within the field of science. Also included in the excursion was a guided tour of some of the facilities on Level 7, where a number of experienced molecular scientists were working. Overall, the excursion provided an insightful taste of life as a real scientist and many students found it to be an extremely valuable learning opportunity.

Geography Excursion

The urban studies fieldwork excursion is the highlight of the Year 12 ATAR Geography course: Planning Sustainable Places. The excursion involves examining the patterns and processes of the internal morphology of Perth, or more simply, studying human settlements. Students travelled to various suburbs of Perth during the excursion in order to conduct their studies. These included venturing to East Perth to examine urban redevelopment, to Northbridge which is the most dynamic zone of the city, West Perth which was once the most prosperous residential area of Perth and Kings Park, where students enjoyed a breathtaking bird's eye view of the CBD and South Perth. The field trip allowed students to gain a more accurate understanding of the way that geography studies work in a practical sense.



R U Ok? Day



"R U OK? Day" is a day dedicated to fostering mental wellbeing by reminding people of the importance of asking friends, family and colleagues the question, "Are you okay?" in a sincere, meaningful way in order to generate conversation and remain connected with the world. The key messages conveyed to students on this day include the belief that we are stronger when unified and it is important to trust our instincts in checking on the welfare of others who may be experiencing challenges. Sevenoaks Senior College attempts to brighten the students' day with cheerful, yellow balloons and positive messages shared amongst students.

Skills West Expo

34 enthusiastic Sevenoaks Senior College students attended this year's Skills West Expo at the Perth Convention and Exhibition Centre on Friday 12 August. The Expo involved numerous opportunities and activities that allowed attendees to sample a taste of different trades, speak to industry experts about training pathways, observe the work of highly skilled trades or simply browse information about different occupations. Students gained an abundance of resource material and knowledge to assist them to now independently research potential courses and qualifications at TAFE colleges, universities and other specialist educational institutions that may be of interest to them.
